*This variable is the 1968 family ID number for the 2002 CDS PCG. The combination of this variable and Person Number (PCGPN02) provides unique identification for each PCG on the data file. Individuals associated with families from the Latino and Immigrant samples, added to the PSID in 1990/1992 and 1997/1999, and 2017 respectively, were assigned 1968 IDs so that they, too, have unique identifiers compatible with the PSID structure for the core (SRC and Census) sample.*
