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#### PREFACE

Volumes I and II of <u>A Panel Study of Income Dynamics</u> contain a history of the study and describe the basic procedures common to all eight waves of interviewing. These volumes also include the tape codes, indexes, available data, questionnaires, and procedures specific to the first five years of the study--1968-1972. Two supplemental volumes describe procedures and codes for Waves VI and VII. The present volume provides this information for Wave VIII.

Three volumes of analysis have also been published based on the first six years of data. These are part of a series called <a href="Five Thousand">Five Thousand</a> <a href="American Families--Patterns">American Families--Patterns</a> of Economic Progress. Volume IV of the series, incorporating seven years of data, is nearing publication and is concerned primarily with changes in economic status resulting from changes in family composition.\* In each of those volumes a chapter is devoted to summaries of other recent research, based on analysis of the Panel data, being conducted here at the University of Michigan and elsewhere. The list is not complete as we don't know who is working on what unless they tell us. If you have research using the data, completed or in progress, please send us a brief summary and expected timetable if you would like to have this information included in Volume V.

#### USING INDIVIDUAL INCOME AND WORK HOUR V'S (1968-1975)

The sum of the Individual Incomes in a family should theoretically equal the Total Family Money Income. However, it is difficult to know to which Individual(s) to attach Family Asset and Transfer Income (to the Head? to the Wife? split between Head and Wife?). For this reason, the 1968-71 Individual Money Income variables contain only Labor Income for Heads and Wives. (For other Individuals in the family, this is in fact their Total Money Income.)

In 1975, we began coding the Individual Transfer income component separately from the Taxable Income and needed to do the same thing for Heads and Wives. Given this, we decided also to add the Asset Income into the Taxable Income for Heads and Wives. (Such income earned by other Individuals in the family has always been included.)

In using any of the Individual Income variables, care must be exercised to assure that the data are comparable. A year-by-year summary is given below.

Comparability is also difficult across years when looking at Individual Work Hours since some of these variables were built incorrectly. The situation is summarized on a year-by-year basis below.

- 1968: V4242 is <u>labor</u> income only for Heads and Wives. V4243 is <u>as documented</u>.
- 1969: V4259 is  $\frac{\text{labor}}{\text{as documented}}$  income only for Heads and Wives.
- 1970: V4276 is <u>labor</u> income only for Heads and Wives.
  V4277 This information should have been transferred in for Heads and Wives, but was not. Instead, the field is filled with nines.

Use V1138 for Head's work hours. Use V1148 for Wife's work hours.

1971: V4293 is <u>labor</u> income only for Heads and Wives.

V4294 This information should have been transferred in for Heads and Wives, but was not. Instead the field is filled with nines.

Use V1839 for Head's work hours. Use V1849 for Wife's work hours.

- 1972: V4311 is  $\underline{labor}$  income only for Heads and Wives. V4312 is  $\underline{as}$  documented.
- 1973: V4335 is <u>labor</u> income only for Heads and Wives. V4336 is as documented.
- 1974: V4356 is labor income only for Heads and Wives. V4357 is as documented.
- 1975: V4380 for Heads is: Head's Labor Y + 1/2(Head + Wife Asset Y).
  for Wives is: Wife's Labor Y + 1/2(Head + Wife Asset Y).
  V4382 is as documented.
  V4384 for some Heads (those with no wife and V3878 GE V3888), the work hours were not transferred in. Instead, the field is filled with nines.
  Use V3823 for Head's work hours.

In general, since for Heads and Wives all the income and work hours information is available in its correct form in the family part of the data, RECODE should be utilized to use that data rather than the information found in the Individual data section--THIS APPLIES TO HEADS AND WIVES ONLY

#### SECTION I

#### PROCEDURES FOR THE 1975 INTERVIEWING YEAR

Part 1: Interviewing Procedures, Response Rates and Data Quality in Telephone Interviewing, 1975 Occupation Codes, and Weights and Independent Part Samples

### Interviewing Procedures

There were a number of new questions in the 1975 questionnaire, making this our longest telephone interview so far. Average interviewing time was 27 minutes, compared to 22 minutes last year and 20 in 1973.

A series of questions added in Section C (Housing) asked if respondents were satisfied with where they lived or were plagued by any of a list of problems which would denote a substandard neighborhood or house.

In Section D (Employment), new questions asked if the respondent: worked for local, state, or federal government; supervised others, was supervised, or both; and if his boss had a supervisor. We also asked if he was covered by a company retirement plan and whether unemployment, if any, occurred in one stretch or several.

Commuting questions, which were previously asked only of household heads, were asked about working wives also (Section G), and in the same section we hope to have eliminated some ambiguities and increased comparability with Census (CAS) data by asking if food stamps were used during the previous month as well as in 1974 and for how many family members they were issued.

In Section H (Income), four new questions attempted to untangle Supplemental Security Income checks from welfare and Social Security payments. We reinstated some questions asked several years ago about the head's savings and his expectations of being better or worse off during the next few years.

We also re-asked a selection of the 1972 feelings questions (Section J) so that splitoffs from the last three years could be included in the answers. Some of these questions were items in the 1968-1972 Efficacy and Planning Indexes. Repeating these questions will also provide an opportunity to see if people's attitudes change over time and perhaps reflect changes in economic status rather than cause them.

An education section (K) was added for both heads and wives, and this year we have coded actual years of schooling instead of bracketing them. For the first time, the name of the college attended, when there was one, was asked, and the colleges have been coded according to a system of evaluation developed at Harvard-M.I.T. to test the hypothesis that by attending certain colleges students acquire credentials which may later be translated into economic status. (See page 52 of this volume.)

We continued the practice, which works very well, of telling the respondents ahead of time--in the <u>Report to Respondents</u> and interviewer's letter--what new questions to expect.

#### **Statistics**

This year 4,836 respondents were interviewed by telephone, 889 either had no telephone or for some other reason were interviewed in person, and a few respondents, mostly living abroad, filled out their own questionnaires As usual, the sample rearranged itself geographically during the year and is presently represented in 37 new counties but in only 49 states. We have no one in Hawaii.

Perhaps due to Watergate-related uneasiness, more respondents than usual needed to be reassured. We wrote 112 persuasion letters, and exactly half of them worked. We had 56 refusals.

The response rate was again 97 percent, 97.8 percent if losses due to death, severe illness, and reunited families are subtracted from the base. We interviewed 343 splitoffs out of a possible 387, giving us a disappointing response rate for new families of 88.6 percent. Most of these losses were indeed lost--at least we could not find them. The response rate for reinterview families, again subtracting those whom we could not possibly have interviewed, was 98.4 percent.

#### Response Rates and Data Quality in Telephone Interviews

In the documentation for 1974 we investigated the possibility that the change from personal to predominately telephone interviews in 1973 might have had some adverse effect on the quality of the data, or the response rate, or both. Here we continue the investigation, adding 1975 information.

The proportion of interviews conducted by telephone continued to

increase (Table 1). We found no evidence, however, that response rates or data quality have suffered. From 1970 on, the response rate remained 97 percent (see Table 2). If telephone interviewing, with its abbreviated questionnaire, had increased the probability of nonheads being respondents, the quality of our data might eventually have been affected. Table 3 shows that since 1972 there had been a reduction of 5.2 percent in the number of interviews taken with the family head—a situation which bears watching in future panel waves. As seen in Table 4, however, the accuracy of the panel data for the whole sample improved from year to year, and the need for assignments decreased—so as yet there seems to be no reason to worry.

Table 4 is based on three variables:

Accuracy of Head's Labor Income Accuracy of Wife's Labor Income Accuracy of Asset Income of Head and Wife.

Accuracy here is determined by the number of assignments made by the editors in order to recreate data missing from an interview. The more assignments, the less reliable the data. The accuracy code values and their meanings are:

- 0. Adequate response: No assignments made.
- 1. <u>Minor assignment:</u> Response was inadequate, but estimates could be made within a probable error of under \$300 or 10 percent of the assignment by using previous years' data or other data in the interview.
- 2. <u>Major assignment</u>: Response was inadequate and estimates had a probable error of at least \$300 and at least 10 percent of the value of the assignment, using any information available in previous interviews or in the current one. Usually these values were assigned from an assignment table.

This table shows the sum of the accuracy codes for the three different income measures. The maximum number possible here would be six for married couples, four for single heads.

#### 1975 Occupation Codes

This year we used a one-digit occupation code and two-digit industry code only. The three-digit occupation code used in 1974 was discontinued for the present, but this information can be coded later if anyone requires it.

#### Weights and Independent Part Samples

The reader is referred to page 33 of Volume I of A Panel Study of Income Dynamics for a discussion of the revised weights as of the end of the fifth year, for both individuals and families, and of the designation of four independent quarter-samples. Weights are essential to reduce bias from differential sampling rates and differential nonresponse. It has not been necessary to revise them since 1972 because nonresponse has been negligible. While it is true that if a statistical model is perfectly specified, weights are unnecessary, models are never perfectly specified. In particular, there are often interaction effects involving race, a dimension on which the sampling rates vary widely, so that an unweighted calculation of a multiple regression model would have biased estimates of the effects of race and of a second independent variable with which it interacted in its effect on some dependent variable.

The use of part samples is recommended for separating the selection of a preferred model from the assessment of its stability and power. Simple random subsamples are not independent of the rest of the sample because of the clustered nature of area probability samples. Therefore, four independent quarter-samples are designated in the code. Almost all the analysis done at the Survey Research Center on these data has ransacked an independent part of the sample and assessed the results on the remainder. How much of the sample should be reserved for statistical testing depends on how unsure one is about the best model and on how important the estimation and testing of one optimal model is felt to be. # Part 3: Editing Procedures and Worksheets

Editing is a process with a threefold purpose: 1) to account for all year-to-year family membership changes, 2) to rectify discrepancies within the interview and prepare it for coding, and 3) to calculate and record numeric data on worksheets to be keypunched. It is a complicated and somewhat confusing task, so every interview is checked by the staff supervisor or an experienced editor.

The editors have the previous years' interviews available to them, but these are used for clarification only when the current year's information is vague, incomplete, or contradictory. Editing is done in two stages: 1) family composition editing and 2) editing of numeric values.

Editors are trained each year with particular attention to changes in the interview schedule. Substantial year-to-year overlap of personnel has kept the quality of editing high. Project staff closely oversee the process, and substantive decisions are made by this staff.

A full description of the editing process will not be undertaken here; it is detailed in our five-year documentation in Volume I. Only changes in editing caused by changes in the interview schedule will be discussed. In keeping with the panel nature of the data, the same techniques were used in Wave VIII as in Waves I-VII.

### Family Composition Editing

All people in a panel family last year must be accounted for this year--either in the old family or as having moved out to form a new family. Sample members who move out are followed and interviewed in the new family. Family composition editing remains unchanged.

#### Changes in the Eighth Wave

There is one major deletion from the edited variables for 1975:

Annual Hours of Housework for Head, Wife and other family members are not available. Future reinstatement of these variables is planned.

#### FOOD STAMPS:

In addition to data concerning use of food stamps last year, we added a series covering current use (Q G17-21). This series more nearly parallels the Census food stamp measure and puts the question about

inclusion of money value of the "bonus" food in the same reference frame with weekly food expenditure.

NOTE: Q G21 - "Did you include in (weekly amount spent on food used at home) only the amount of money you actually spent or did you also include the extra value of the food you get with stamps" - was incorrectly documented in 1974.

The extra value of food gotten with stamps was not deducted from Annual Food Expenditure in 1974 or in 1975. This deduction was made in 1972 when the question was first used in the panel study. Remember also that this question in 1975 refers only to last month and not to last year.

In an effort to make Annual Food Stamp variables more accurate, we added a question to ascertain the amount of time food stamps were used in 1974 if not used regularly.

#### SUPPLEMENTAL SECURITY INCOME:

On January 1, 1974, individuals receiving Old Age Assistance (OAA), Aid to the Blind, and Aid to the Permanently or Totally Disabled (APTD) were converted to Supplemental Security Income (SSI). Those who received a low level of Social Security were also subsidized through the same program to bring payments more in line with needs. Because the program was administered through the Social Security Administration, some confusion on the part of our respondents was foreseen. Several questions were added in our income sequence in hope of sorting out SSI income if it turned up confounded with some other form of transfer income, especially Social Security. We found that in general people were aware of the change and were also aware that it was not Social Security. The questions did allow us to be quite sure that as much mixing of SSI with other transfers as possible was avoided. SSI was added to the list of transfer income variables with its own field and as with ADC, AFDC, and Social Security, the Head's and the Wife's income from SSI were mingled rather than separated.


### TRANSFER INCOME OF OTHERS:


This year we have given detail like that for Head and Wife in the amounts of Transfer Income of Others. It is now possible to know from where this income arrives and how much. Coupled with codes from the

#### ASSET INCOME OF OTHERS:


A separate field has been added for total asset income of all others (V94). Note please that this money is also included in Total Taxable Income of Others (V91)--do not add the two.







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# Part 4: Coding Procedures

#### Introduction

As described in Part 3, translation from respondent replies to digits on a data file requires editing of complex materials, such as dividing income into its various components and calculating income/need standards. It also requires coding to convert nonnumerical answers into numbers. With open-ended questions, it is a matter of some importance how reliable this coding process is and, particularly in a panel study, whether the procedures are stable from one year to the next. Indeed, systematically changed procedures can do more damage than a little random error. The stability of this process from year to year, or coding "drift," has been studied; the results may be found in the 1973 manual.\* In this section only the question of reliability, or inter-coder variance, is dealt with. This reliability is essentially a measure of the ambiguity of the codes and accuracy of the coders.

# Coding Procedures

Coders were trained by the head of the Center's Coding Section and by a member of the analysis staff before they were allowed to production-code interviews, at which time they were given constant supervision by an analysis staff member. Prior to production-coding, all coders were required to code two practice interviews to illustrate some of the problems that might be encountered. Approximately 10 percent (590) of the interviews were coded twice--once by the coder and a second time by an analysis staff member (or check coder). Check coding consisted of an item-by-item check of the coded values with those values independently coded by a second person. This enabled the analysis staff to determine before many interviews had been coded whether any coder was having difficulty and if any particular codes were causing unnecessary problems.

Since 1973, the interviews have been shorter than in the first five years, and many open-ended questions, which had been difficult from the

coders' viewpoint, have been eliminated. Therefore, after 1972, errors and differences were significantly lower. A difference is a disagreement between the coder and check-coder; differences become errors when they are so judged by the check-coder. Most errors which are not caught in check-coding are discovered and corrected during data-cleaning operations. This procedure assumes that when the coder and check-coder are in agreement, no error was made.

# Coding Errors

Four items had error rates greater than 2 percent. Errors in Variable 184 (Question D18. "How long have you had this job?") were due to problems in bracketing; this same question is also coded in actual years on the job, however, and should present no problems. Variable 285, which is the second mention coded on why things might be better or worse for the respondent in the future, had the most errors of any item. Most often the coder was trying to force a mention where there was none codeable. Errors in Variables 298 and 299 (Questions K6. "What other schooling did you (HEAD) have?" and K8. "Do you (HEAD) have a college degree?") were mainly due to problems in distinguishing the exact nature of the head's training beyond the high school level, i.e., whether it was academic or nonacademic. Other errors occurred in Question K6. between code 2, job-specific training, and code 3, company-specific training. In Question K8., code 5 includes associate degrees. At the commencement of coding, this was often overlooked. However, during consistency checking, this was corrected.

# Coding Disagreements

Question B2. "Is it (public transportation) good enough so that a person could use it to get to work?" (V129) attempts to get a subjective evaluation of the adequacy of public transportation in the respondent's area. Major disagreements in this question are between code 1, good, and 3, pro-con, and between codes 1 and 9, not ascertained: Sometimes respondents' replies were not very clear, and there was difficulty in deciding whether or not additional remarks included qualifications.

Questions C16. and C19. (V's 143 and 146), which ask why the respondent has moved since the previous interview, if he has, and why he might move in the future, if he might, use the same code. This year the code was expanded

to break out some categories formerly lumped in categories 1 and 2, as follows:

#### Old Code

- 1. Purposive productive reasons: 1. To take another job to take another job; to get nearer to work
- 2. Purposive consumptive reasons: more or less space; less rent; better neighborhood; want to own a home; better house; got married
- 3. Response to outside events

# New Code

- 2. To get nearer to work
- Expansion of housing: 3. more space; better house
- 4. Contraction of housing: less space; less rent
- 5. Other house-related: want to own home; got married
- 6. Neighborhood-related: better neighborhood
- 7. Response to outside events

The majority of disagreements in these variables were between code 8 and codes 5, 6, and 7. Code 8 is a catchall category; ambiguous or mixed reasons are put there, and in the variety of responses it is easy to throw complicated replies into it.

Question H57. (V283) asks the respondent's outlook on his future-whether he thinks he'll be better or worse off. Variables 284 and 285 (Question H58.) code two mentions on reasons given in support of the respondent's prognosis. These three variables are repeats from 1971 interviewing. Most of the disagreements on V283 are between code 9 and the others. Many respondents did not simply choose a straight "better off" or "worse off" response, but went on at length about what they hoped for, changing their minds several times in the process, thus causing confusion during coding. Variables 284 and 285, which are priority codes and therefore dependent on each other, suffered most from the coders' lack of knowledge about types of income and financial affairs, as editors deal with distinctions of this sort.

Section J, Feelings, presented coding problems which are only too The five questions contained therein were asked in Waves I-V and were difficult then as well as now. The codes are composed of fivepoint Likert scales, which cover degrees of agreement with one or the other of two alternatives. Whenever the respondent chooses one extreme, coding is simple, but qualifications and pro-con replies complicate the situation.

The last variable, V298 (K6.), asks the head of household about schooling received besides grade and high school. Coding disagreements were usually between codes 2 and 3; distinguishing between job-specific and company-specific training programs was not as easy as expected, mostly due to lack of sufficient information from the respondent.

Overall coding error rate for 1975 was 0.76 per interview, compared with 0.47 in 1974. The appearance of several questions which have traditionally had high disagreement rates, as well as high error rates, contributed significantly to the rise in the overall number of errors. Again this year, almost the entire coding staff was new, which means high error rates early on, tapering off to a more reasonable level later on.

#### Part 5: Generated Variables and Additional Data

Various indexes, bracket variables, and complex measures of economic status have been constructed each year using variables derived directly from coded interview data. Changes in the 1975 interview have made additions and deletions of indexes necessary. In general, if an index could not be built to be exactly comparable to a previous year's index, no index was constructed.

#### Income

Several measures of economic status have been generated for all eight years, including money income variables and measures of income adequacy. Family money income, one of the simplest indexes, is the total of all family members' earnings, transfers, and capital income (1975 V354). Total real income and net real income could not be created for 1975 because there was no information about nonmoney income.

# Ratio of Income to Needs

Measurement of a family's economic status requires a comparison of the family's income with some measure of its needs. For analytical purposes, a convenient measure of this relationship is expressed by a ratio of family income to family needs. Total family money income divided by family needs standard (1975 V371) is the only income to needs ratio available for 1975.

### The Needs Standards

See the volume of documentation for this survey for interviewing year 1974 for a detailed description.  $^{2}$ 

#### Bracket Variables

Several numerical variables, such as family money income, have been

collapsed into bracket (interval) codes. Such variables have been constructed for most of the measures where a distribution is useful and appropriate. This includes practically all of the income variables and their components.

#### Race

Because the 1975 interview schedule was designed for telephone use, race of respondent, which comes from interviewer observation, was not obtained this year. Respondents were assigned race from 1972 data. In the case of a splitoff, race was assigned from 1972 data of the splitoff's main family (1975 V404).

# Regional Data Measures

In addition to personality and behavior, locational and environmental factors are potentially important determinants of an individual's economic status. Consequently, the personal interview data have been supplemented with information on the employment and income characteristics of the county where the panel family lives. Since available published statistics on employment by county are generally several years old, questionnaires have been sent each year to state employment offices asking them about the current labor market situation in these counties. These questions have been standard for several years; however, in 1975 the code for percent unemployment was changed. The code can be collapsed to be comparable with previous years (1975 V's 425-430).

### Housing and Neighborhood Quality Indexes

Included in the 1975 interview was a series of questions about respondents' dwellings and neighborhoods. Scores have been added to form indexes of housing quality and neighborhood quality. Housing Quality (1975 V400) is a summation of Q.C20-C29, while Neighborhood Quality (1975 V401) sums Q.C30-C39. In each case the maximum score is 15, with lower numbers indicating higher perceived quality. See Tape Code in this volume for specifics.

Respondents were asked in what type of structure they live (1975 V138). While the coding of this variable is not comparable to other years in which the interviewer answered the question by observation, it was considered to be an important addition to the data.

# College Ratings

In order to update our data concerning educational attainment of Head and Wife, a series of questions was asked about amount of education each has finished. Part of the series (Section K, 1975 V's 293-306) was a question asking the name(s) of the college(s) each attended. Four scores are included in the 1975 data for Head and for Wife based on the college attended:

- 1) Average ACT score of freshman (1975 V's 416 and 420)
- 2) Estimated expenditure per student (1975 V's 417 and 421)<sup>1</sup>
- 3) A prestige rating covering the period 1935-1954 (1975 V's 418 and 422)
- 4) A prestige rating covering the period 1970-1974 (1975 V's 419 and 423)

# ACT Score

The ACT score consists of SAT composite scores, ACT composite scores, or estimates of these scores. All institutional means were converted to the equivalent ACT mean score as described in A. W. Astin, <a href="Predicting">Predicting</a> Academic Performance in College (Free Press, 1971).

The ACT score is a composite of four "tests" dealing with social science, natural science, math, and English and is sometimes considered to measure educational development or achievement, but may well have a component of motivation as well as one of basic aptitude or "intelligence.' It is heavily dependent on capacity to handle the English language.

The SAT tests give equal weights to a verbal and a mathematical component and are thus somewhat more heavily weighted on ability to handle mathematics and somewhat less dominated by ability to manage English.

ACT is heavily used in the Midwest and not available for many of the elite colleges which call for SAT tests.

Without going into the raging controversy about genetic endowment versus quality of formal education versus home background, we can suggest that there are substantial differences among children within the same family going to the same schools, which indicates either genetic variability

or personality differences. There are experts who maintain that even tests which seem to measure achievement, information, and retention of facts or procedures are also measuring a generalized aptitude.

# Prestige Ratings

"The ratings are designed to suggest the social prestige of having been a student at and/or an alumnus of the particular institution. They refer only to attendance as an undergraduate. They do not refer to prestige derived from attending the professional or graduate schools attached to the institutions. They do not attempt to assay the educational quality of the undergraduate instruction. They are only measures of the social status of the student body, and predicted social status of the alumni.

"I have developed these ratings subjectively. I have looked into such matters as which undergraduate fraternities and sororities established chapters where and when. I have considered which colleges have played which other ones in football through the years. I have pored through the American Council on Education's quadrennial publications back to 1928, charting changes in tuition levels, endowment and net worth, and professorial qualifications. The social prestige ratings that I have rendered for each college are my own 'best judgment.' The ratings are not necessarily generalizable beyond the specified periods. For the purposes of correlation analysis, however, it is satisfactory to apply the first rating to all persons who attended college before 1955 and to apply the second rating to all persons who attended college after 1955."

#### Part 6: Data Available

For each year of this study both an individual unit and a family unit tape have been created. In addition, the family tape has been merged with the previous years' family tapes so that there are two, three, four, five, six, seven, and eight merged family tapes. The individual tapes were merged on five, six, seven, and eight-year bases only. Two tapes have also been created using the 1967 S.E.O. data for that part of the sample that was originally interviewed by the Census.

For a detailed description of these tapes, see <u>Panel Study of Income Dynamics</u>, Volume I, 1972. Briefly, the annual family tapes include one record for each family interviewed that year. The family-individual tapes contain one record for each individual in these families. Included on each record is information specific to the individual plus all the data for the family in which the person was living that year.

The eight-year merged family tape contains all eight years of data for every family interviewed in 1975. The record for a family which was formed after 1968 contains the data for the main family for the years before the new unit split off. The eight-year individual tape contains the data for the family in which the individual was living each of the seven years and all eight years of individual information. The tape contains records for the following individuals:

- a. Sample members living in the panel families (or in institutions) in 1968 through 1975.
- b. Sample members who were born after 1968. The individual data for these children contain zeros for the years before they were born except for their 1968 person numbers (V4234).
- c. Sample members who were living in panel families in 1968 but who subsequently died or moved out and were not followed. The individual records after these members left contain zeros. Their weight is also zero. These records should only be used to generate 1968 family composition variables (e.g., number of preschool children).
- d. Nonsample members living with panel families in 1975 who moved in after 1968. Individual information before they moved in contains zeros, except for the 1968 person numbers (V4234), and their weight is also zero.

There is a variable on the merged individual tape specifying the type of

individual record for years one through five only. This may, however, be updated by the user. This tape is very long (approximately 19,000 records with 8,000 tape locations), so machine capacity should be considered before attempting analysis on this tape.

#### Part 7: Notes on Use of Data

# Tricky Aspects of a Self-Replacing Panel

In order to use panel data, one must understand the demography of populations that are continually being replaced. The average age of such a population does not change, even though each member ages, because each year a few very old people die and are "replaced" by some very young ones. Due to this replacement, a panel containing the same families never represents aggregate trends.

The panel data allow one to look at the history of any family which contains sample members in the last year, but this implies the introduction of duplicate family records for earlier years in cases where the members of that early family have divided into two or more current ones. To average the 1967 income for all families in the 1974 panel, then, does not give a measure of the average income of all families in 1967. Restricting the analysis to families with the same heads of household all seven years may eliminate too much; the "same head" subgroup is excellent for following fortunes of people over the period, but not for describing national trends. For instance, the splitoffs, who are mostly just entering the labor force, suffer the most unemployment, move the most, have the largest increases in income.

For some purposes, it might prove optimal to study year-to-year changes for all units with the same head for those two years, minimizing the population-turnover problem. For others, it is clearly best to look at <a href="individuals">individuals</a> so only those who die or disappear are lost. Means for these individuals or their subgroups will, except for nonresponse, represent national trends.

# Employment Sequences

The user may have observed that each head of household is asked a different sequence of questions, based upon his reply to question D1. "We would like to know about your (Head's) present job--are you (Head) working now, looking for work, retired, a housewife, or what?" Current employment status may be irrelevant to 1974 labor force participation, especially in these times of high unemployment, and, therefore, we have added a new index this year which tabulates all variables in the sequence V3968-V4052, as some of the questions in each of the three employment-related sections are

similar. Please see Section III, Part 4, for further details.

# On Creating a Family Tape From the Merged Eight-Year Individual Tape

Since the eight-year individual tape is very unwieldy with its almost 20,000 cases and 8,000 tape locations, and the researcher might well be interested in analyzing the data largely from a family basis, it was thought helpful to append suggestions on the creation of a family file from the individual data.

The structure of the individual file combines family data for each person in the family unit with that person's unique individual information. Each individual is assigned a unique sequence number (V4366) which indicates that person's position on the 1975 list of people in the family; thus, the first person listed is 01, the second person listed is 02, and so on. To create a family file, it is necessary only to write off onto a new tape those cases where V4366 = 01, since each family must have at least one member, although it may or may not have two or more. It is suggested that V4366 be used as opposed to V4367, relationship to head, because although each family has one and only one <u>current</u> head (i.e., where V4366 = 01-20), it is possible that the head of the family has moved out since the previous interview and a new head has become ensconced. Relation—ship to head of movers—out is coded with reference to last year's head, so for both the current head and the previous head, V4367 = 1.

These instructions were tried out on the <a href="seven-year">seven-year</a> merged individual tape, with the result that 5,515 cases out of 5,517 were located successfully; two individuals had mysteriously disappeared. The two cases with no sequence number 01 were isolated and added. It was felt that the expense of finding these two cases was insignificant compared with the cost of purchasing a family tape in addition to the individual one, and a special check has been made near the end of processing the eight-year individual data to insure that (hopefully) there will be no such surprises in store for anyone attempting the above-mentioned method on it.

### SECTION III

### INDEXES

In this eighth-year documentation, four variable indexes are included which attempt to organize the data for easy reference. The first is an alphabetical arrangement by topic of family data only, with the pertinent variables listed. The second index is a list of 1975 family data in order by variable number, with comparable 1968-1974 variables. Thirdly, there is an individual index similar in format to the family numerical one described above. The last index compares questions in Sections D, E, and F of the questionnaire. However, these variable numbers are valid only for the eight-year merged tape. Although all of these have been checked and double-checked, the possibility remains that there may still be errors. Therefore, we cannot warn the user strongly enough to please use these only in conjunction with the tape code.

These indexes list variable numbers only. For those who are using tape location format, a listing of the dictionary (found before the data on a standard file) will give a quick reference of the tape locations corresponding to each variable number.

# Part 1: Alphabetical Index of Eight-Year Family Code

Since this index is a compilation of all variables on the 1968-1969-1970-1971-1972-1973-1974-1975 merged family-unit tape, no individual data are included, and the only change variables included are those for 1968-1969." All raw data and generated variables are to be found in alphabetical order by topic. Cross-referencing was attempted, although this may not be as complete as the user would wish. No attempt was made to describe variables in detail, since this is the purpose of the tape code, and this index is meant to be used only in conjunction with that invaluable document. All accuracy codes can be found under the "Accuracy" heading rather than under a specific topic such as "Housing." Note that such terms as "head" or

There are seven exceptions: change in family composition between 1968-1969, 1969-1970, 1970-1971, 1971-1972, 1972-1973, 1973-1974, and 1974-1975.

"wife" do not necessarily designate the same person in the data from different years. Hence, if the user wishes demographic information about the head of the unit at the end of the panel period, he must use that given in the latest year's data.

#### NOTES ON COMPARABILITY OF INDIVIDUAL INCOME

This year, due to a growing demand for more detailed information on individual incomes, each person's income was split into taxable and transfer amounts. By adding these two components, a new variable can be created that will be comparable to the individual's total money income of previous years.

It was also though unnecessary to continue coding missing data on individual incomes and work hours, as had been done since 1968, because editors must assign amounts for family tape totals anyway. Therefore, each income and hours variable now has its own accuracy code. For comparability, one could exclude all cases where an assignment was made in 1975 or missing data coded in previous years.

### Part 4: Index of the 1975 Employment Sections

This index compares the different variables asked of Heads based on their employment status (V3967) in 1975. Some of these variables overlap. In analysis it might be desirable, for instance, to look at weeks worked in 1974 for all Heads regardless of whether they are currently employed or unemployed. With the tabulations in this index, the user can tell at a glance whether or not the same question was asked of all Heads. Using the example given above, one could generate a new variable on weeks worked in 1974 simply by adding V3998 + V4027 + V4043; since one and only one of these variables contains this information for each Head, the other two containing zeros show that the question is inappropriate.
